## SEND Parent Update

April 2024

Dear Parents and Carers,

It gives me great pleasure to be able to update you on some of the many excellent Special Educational Needs developments we have been working on recently so that all pupils have a settled and productive start at Whitby School in September. These really are exciting times.

Firstly, may I extend a thank you to the parents who continue to give up their time to discuss and provide feedback on some key SEND documents through the Parents' Forum. We have found their comments and observations really insightful. This has led to improvements in our processes and paperwork. Thank you for being 'part of the team'. We are grateful to you all.

We intend to relocate the SEND space at the Upper School site (Years 9 – 13) to a more suitable, ground floor location with larger classrooms, a medical area and separate SEND room. This will be perfect for pupils with SEND for their one-to-one and small group activity work as well as providing a comfortable, caring space for breaktimes. This will be ideal for those pupils who are anxious about less structured times of the school day.

Such is our commitment to SEND that we have decided to ensure this provision is also in place on the Lower School site (Year 7 and Year 8). These spaces have been carefully considered to ensure they are at the heart of the school. This will mean that pupils have access to the support they need when they need it. We await the outcome of funding discussions to determine if our current plan can be enacted from September.

We have also proposed a specific space for pupils with social and emotional needs too. We are working with the local authority to determine the feasibility of this from January 2025. We hope we will be successful and that we will be able to widen our support soon.

We have been working hard to agree changes to how we recognise and add pupils to the SEND register. Following excellent feedback from our Parents' Forum we have clarified expectations regarding communication. This is because we want you, as parents, to be fully included and informed about your child's progress and their academic challenges. We hope these changes, from September, will

help you to understand what additional support your child is receiving and why. More detailed information is to follow.

We have also reviewed the support we provide for pupils with social and emotional needs. Over the course of the autumn term, we hope to provide training for staff on how to best support pupils who have mental health needs. These will be a mixture of small group and individual sessions as well as regular check-ins with key members of staff. It is important to all staff at Whitby School that pupils feel ready to learn when they arrive and to this end, we have also now drafted our expectations of our learning environments and approaches to teaching that every child should experience. With SEND pupils at the heart of our changes, we are confident that all pupils will thrive with us. I look forward to being able to share our teaching and learning expectations and approaches with you in a future update.

Finally, we have involved pupils' views to form a key part of our revised behaviour policy by incorporating their views of what they expect in terms of the conduct and behaviour of their peers. Our revised behaviour policy will go through various stages of consultation in the coming weeks, before it is finalised.

Things really are moving along at pace so that we can be ready for a smooth start in September. Hopefully, these weekly updates are giving you a small but useful window into the work we are doing.

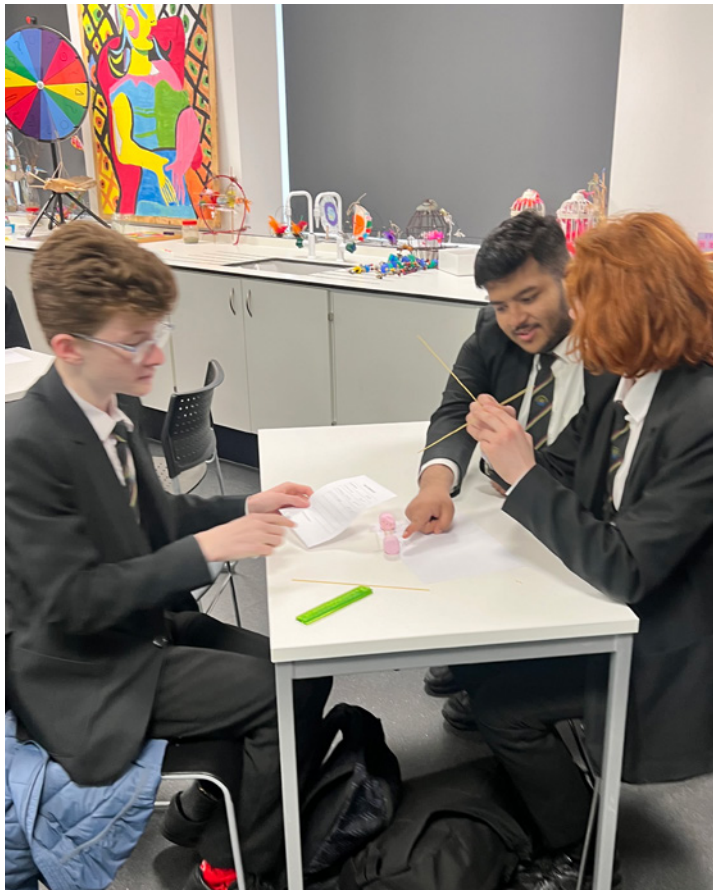

### Business Experience Day

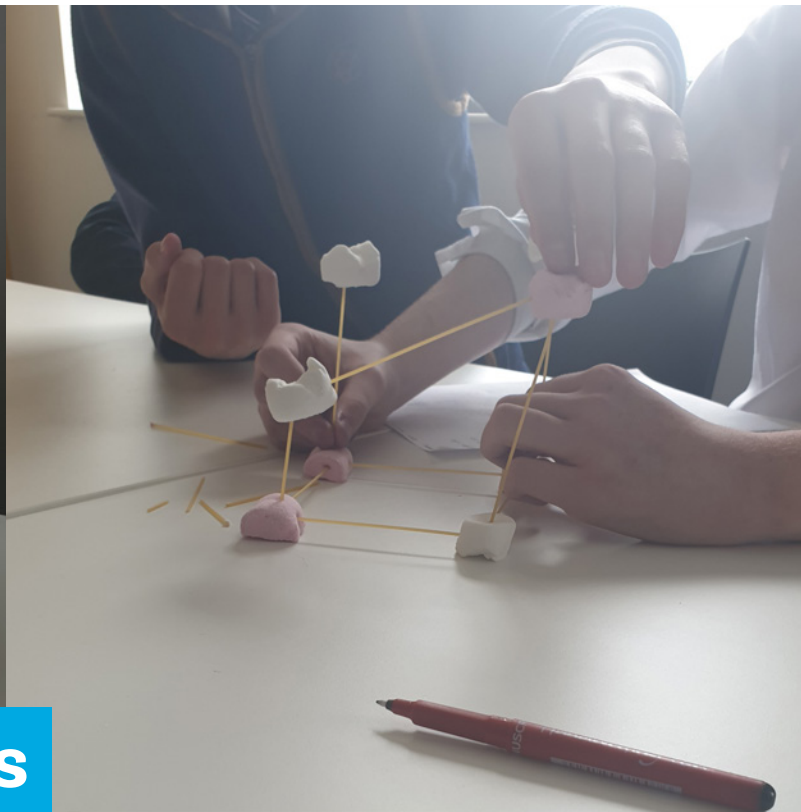
Year 10 business pupils from Caedmon and Eskdale took part in a business experience day at CU Scarborough. They completed activities in project management, branding, finance, sales and communication.

### Whitby Fishing School

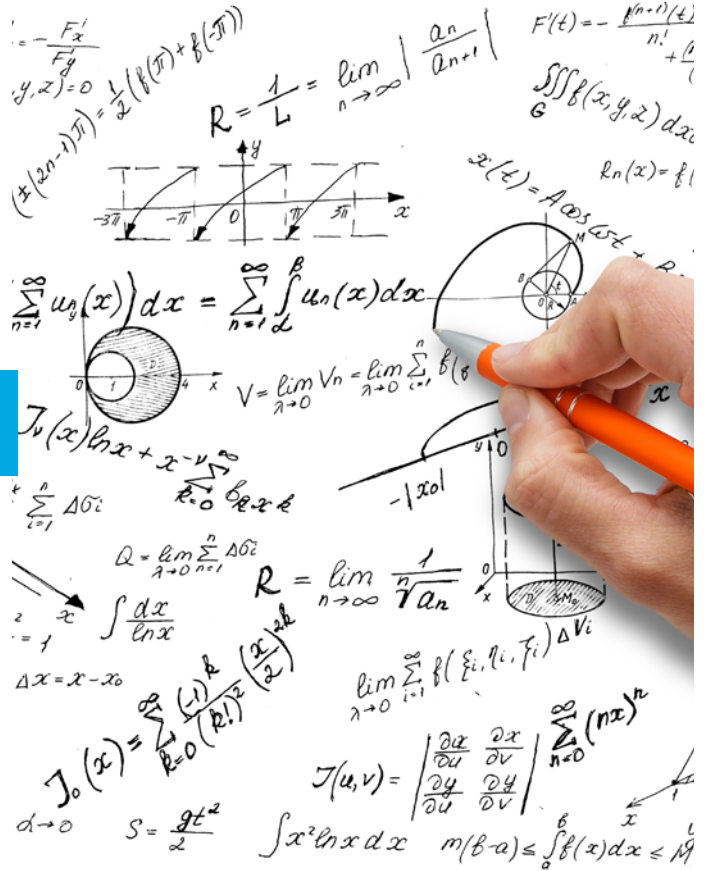
**On Monday morning several of our pupils from Year 8 and above attended a talk from Andy Hodgson, the CEO at Whitby Fishing School.**

## Why study Further

## Maths at WSF

### What will I study?

Students taking Further Mathematics overwhelmingly find it to be an enjoyable and rewarding experience. In fact, they often say it's their favourite subject! For someone who enjoys mathematics, it provides a challenge and a chance to explore new and/or more sophisticated mathematical concepts. Students who take further mathematics find that the additional time spent studying mathematics boosts their marks in single A-level mathematics.

### What do students do afterwards?

If you are planning to take a degree such as engineering, sciences, computing, finance/economics, etc, or perhaps mathematics itself, you will benefit enormously from taking further mathematics, at least to AS-level. AS further mathematics introduces new topics such as matrices and complex numbers that are vital in many science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) degrees. Students who have studied further mathematics find the transition to such degrees far more straightforward.

### How will I be assessed?

100% exam at the end of the course.

### What can I do to prepare?

Talk to other students who are already doing the course and ask them what they have done or wish they had done.

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about SHOPPING PLATFORMS

For people looking to make purchases on their phones, several shopping apps – such as Temu – allow users to buy goods at reduced prices. Others, like Vinted and Depop, let you sell items you no longer want. As internet shopping continues to grow, however, so does the risk of scammers, hackers and breaches of privacy.

## WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

### MISSING ITEMS

Users of Vinted, Depop and Temu have reported not receiving their products despite payment being taken. Users can initially contact the seller to query a missing item, and they have between two and five days (depending on the app) to tell the company what has happened. However, once the money has reached the supposed 'seller', it can be quite difficult to get back.

### SCAMMERS AND PHISHING

Scammers are always on the lookout for unsuspecting buyers or sellers. Common tactics include cancelling shipment of an item once the payment has been processed or asking to conclude the chat and payment outside of the app, where the victim is no longer protected by the buyer protection plan. This should, naturally, be avoided at all costs.

### DATA MISUSE

Apps of all kinds frequently collect our data, often asking for more information than is necessary to set up an account. Data gathered in this way is then usually sold on to third parties for marketing purposes. Lately, certain apps have been under scrutiny for using spyware to track their members' activities – but all too often, the user's consent to this practice has been hidden away in the terms and conditions.

### FAKES OR REPLICAS

It's certainly not unheard of for poor-quality products to be falsely marketed as luxury items, using misleading pictures or clever wording. These disingenuous sales are sometimes outed by suspiciously low price tags, but this isn't always the case. For children and young people especially, there's a risk that the promise of bagging a high-end item for a fraction of its usual price will outshine any suspicions they may have.

### SLOW REFUNDS

While all apps offer a refund if the product is damaged or doesn't match the description, it can take up to a month to be compensated for this. For many people (especially during a cost-of-living crisis) that can be a long time to be without both the product you bought and the hard-earned cash you spent on it.

### MISLEADING DESCRIPTION

Some people will be able to notice when, say, a product's photo and its description don't seem to match. This isn't a reliable means of picking up on misleading marketing, however – especially not for children and young people, many of whom may not yet realise that such practices even exist. While it's illegal to advertise one thing and sell another, plenty of shady traders use clever wording and omissions to get around this.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

### ALWAYS STAY ON THE APP

It's vital that users pay for any goods through the same app on which they found them, to ensure they are covered by buyer protection. This means users can access support if the item arrives damaged, isn't as described, or doesn't arrive at all – allowing them to seek compensation for the loss. Such regulations can't protect you, however, if you didn't do the deal through the app in question.

### BE WARY OF PHISHING ATTEMPTS

Scammers frequently send messages within these apps to steal personal and financial information from other users. Don't respond to these messages – and under no circumstances should you follow any links they contain. Check for spelling errors, as well as inspecting the name of the sender. Report any suspected phishing emails to the app's help centre – and notify your bank if you think your financial information has been compromised.

### CHECK REVIEWS

Take time to read the reviews and comments left by other users – not just of products, but of sellers and buyers, to ensure they're legitimate and reliable. Before buying an item online, check the reviews for comments about the product's quality, the seller's communication and the delivery time. If you're selling, check the reviews of your buyer for red flags such as frequent requests for refunds or claims of 'missing' items.

### KEEP SAFE AS A SELLER

Sellers can be exploited just as much as buyers. Some users may purchase an item, for example, then pretend it didn't arrive to secure a refund. Always take photos of the shipping label, along with a picture of you posting the item. Send the package's tracking number to the buyer and keep a copy for yourself, letting you investigate any future claims that it never arrived. When taking photos of items you're selling, ensure nothing personal is in the background.

### Meet Our Expert
