Battlefields Visit

Mr Gildroy writes:

86 Year 9 students from both Caedmon and Eskdale went to Belgium and France as part of our Battlefields visit. The visit enabled the students to develop their prior knowledge of the First World War and to see first hand the scale of its impact on the Western Front.









The students spent Saturday around Ypres in Belgium where they saw war memorials at Tynecot and Langemark. As well as visiting trenches at Sanctuary Wood and Hooge Crater. In the evening students spent time in the centre of Ypres where they had the opportunity to buy some Belgian chocolates before observing the final post ceremony at Menin Gate.

The following day we ventured into France to visit the historic sites at Vimy Ridge and the Somme. Students visited the Thiepval war memorial where a Caedmon College poppy wreath was placed by one of our students.


The results are in, and absolutely superb for four young and hard working musicians in their recent instrumental exams.

Why study Politics at WSF

What will I study and how will I be assessed?

Lively, relevant, controversial. These are just some of the ways to describe A-level Politics. Covering news and events in the UK and USA (past and present) we will look at different political controversies, such as: should Matt Hancock have gone on I'm a Celebrity? Will Donald Trump become US president again?

100% examination at the end of the course on three papers:

Paper 1: Government and Politics of the UK (33.3%) – This unit comprises a study of the nature of the UK, constitution and the issues and debates around it. You will examine the structure and role of parliament and how accountable it is. The topic of the Prime Minister and their relationship with Cabinet and Parliament. As well as the relationship with the EU and devolved nations.

Paper 2: Government and Politics of the USA and Comparative Politics (33.3%) – this unit is made up of topics similar to the UK and include the US constitution, the president, and civil rights. A comparative unit is included based on UK and US politics.

Paper 3: Political ideas (33.3%) – This unit looks at four distinct ideologies, three of which are compulsory: Liberalism, Conservatism and Socialism. As well as one optional ideology from Nationalism, Multi-culturalism, and Feminism (which will be decided with the class which they would prefer to focus on). Students are given the opportunity to examine each ideology, the various 'thinkers' associated with each ideology and relate this to thinking on human nature, the state, society, and the economy.

What do students do afterwards?

Politics is an increasingly popular academic qualification which is highly valued by universities and employers, due to students developing research, written communication, and debate skills. Students have gone on to study various topics at university such as, politics, sociology, history, advertising. The course has helped provide students with employment in various industries including politics, law, international organisations, the media, government and the civil service.

What can I do to prepare?

The best thing that you can do is to keep up to date with what is going on with politics. You can do this by watching the news, PMQs or reading what is happening on your phones. Come and talk to Mr Gildroy who will be happy to discuss the content and style of teaching and learning in more depth. If you can't come and see us send an email with any questions you have.

Enrichment opportunities

Sports Day 2008

With fine weather predicted for the annual Normanby Sports Day expectations around college were high. The morning of the 21 July however proved anything but with cold winds and an overcast sky, temperatures barely making it into double figures. Despite the cold, once again we saw an impressive number of participants across all the year groups and high-quality performances in a whole range of activities.

The golf tournament began the day's festivities. Despite an abbreviated competition due to the inclement weather, the event held at Whitby Golf Club was eventually won by Cholmley after a great performance from Dan Brown who stood up to the ferocious conditions a la Padraig Harrington in the British Open. It was Cholmley House who began the morning activities in fine form. Victory was theirs in the trampolining, orienteering, indoor rowing, and badminton competitions. Kerry Storr deserves the plaudits for a solid trampolining routine that gave her a convincing victory. In a close orienteering event Cholmley managed to pip Scoresby to victory by seconds. The tables were turned in tennis with Scoresby defeating Cholmley into second place. Albany came out on top in the Cross Country competition, their only victory in the morning activities. The race was won by Jack Jordan (Scoresby) but impressive runs by Sam Hutchinson, Adrian Swaine, Tom Steyert and Tom Lodge gave Albany enough points for overall victory. In a dramatic Rounders event Cholmley finally secured the win with a





narrow 5 rounders to 4½ defeat of Scoresby in the last game (on such fine margins are Sports Days won and lost!).

By the conclusion of the morning activities Cholmley had a narrow lead over Scoresby with Albany struggling in third: Albany 36 points, Scoresby 50 points, Cholmley 58 points.

By the time the afternoon activities began the question on everybody's lips was 'could Cholmley hold on to their lead?' (well, nearly everybody's lips!).

One of the newer events for Sports Day - the Chess competition (for the less energetic but more intellectually inclined students) - was closely fought with eventually Cholmley declared the winners.

The afternoon events ran like clockwork with the sun finally deciding to make an appearance adding to the atmosphere for both competitors and spectators (who incidentally were a credit to the College, enthusiastically cheering on the competitors). In the 'big' team events each House battled away for every point available but it was Cholmley who continued to set the pace with 4 vital victories in the football, hockey, cricket and rugby competitions. Scoresby were successful in the basketball competition and Albany took the honours in the netball tournament. In a closely fought table-tennis competition all three houses finished level.

All the students came together during the last part of the afternoon to take part in and support the track athletics

competition with students participating in various relay races. The enthusiasm and commitment was fantastic and it was Cholmley who were crowned athletics champions for the second year running!

With the competition reaching its inevitable climax could the recently introduced staff/student fun relay race be the defining moment. Despite the enthusiastic response from the crowd, a fine effort from Ms Malone the answer, alas, was no. Nobody exactly knows who actually triumphed despite protestations from some staff and counter claims of cheating from others.

Ultimately, by the time of the last event – the tug-of-war competition - Cholmley had wrapped up a comprehensive Sports Day victory and the ensuing battle was purely for the runners-up spot (Albany managing to pip Scoresby for the honour).

Cholmley successfully finished the day with 159 points which sets a new overall points tally for Sports Day and was their first victory in four years. Defending champions Albany came second on a distant 120 with Scoresby finishing in a close third on 117 points.

Students not participating in the 'competition' events took part in a very active session of body combat, well done
Ms Drummond and Ed Turner. My thanks must go to the
PE department for ensuring Sports Day was, once again, a



real success. Both competitors and spectators conducted themselves admirably and were a credit to their respective Houses. Thanks must go, also, to staff involved in the day, particularly those who took responsibility for events and ensured their smooth running from start to finish. Lastly, a final thank you to Ann Noble who acted as scorer on the day, as she has done for many years, and who is retiring after 30 years of teaching at Whitby Community College!

3rd Scoresby - 117 points




